Due to my poor early season results, I had quite a bad seeding during the event. The 5km skate I started 5th out of 45 participants (the small field size is a result of only qualified college athletes being able to compete in this event. For example, only 3 females and 3 males from my team were selected and able to complete). It was not until the 20th skier crossed that line that my time was finally bested. At the end of the day, I managed to hold onto 10th place, earning myself an All-American Honours which awarded to the top 10 finishers. Not only was this my best college result over the last 4 years, but it was also one of the best results of my skiing career. As an added bonus, I also recorded the fastest time on the course for the women at the speed trap.
